

Annual Deaths from Colorectal Cancer in Assembly District 19

69

Each year thousands of Californians die from colorectal cancer – a disease that is **preventable, treatable and curable**. In Assembly District 19, an average of 69 citizens die unnecessarily each year.

Screening saves lives, and should start at age 50 for those with no family history of the disease. Unfortunately, not everyone knows this, and many more do not have access to screening – **the most cost-effective cancer screening program**.

Anyone can get colorectal cancer, especially those over age 50. Everyone should have access to screening, but not everyone does.
